APRIL SHOWERS BRING MAY FLOWERS AND RUNOFF

Stormwater management not only focuses on flood control but also involves sustaining and improving water quality in our watersheds. Stormwater runoff can affect the chemical, physical, and biological properties of our streams, rivers, and lakes.

Increased development reduces naturally absorbent vegetation, such as meadows and wetlands, increasing the flows of stormwater, creating flash floods. Consider incorporating some of these best practices of storm water management, to help increase water filtration, remove pollution, prevent erosion, and sustain wildlife habitats:





- Clear your storm drains: Keep your storm drains clear of leaves, grass clippings, trash, debris, snow and ice.
- Create a rain garden: Rain gardens are bowl-shaped gardens designed to capture water, allowing it to soak into the ground. They can drain water from roof downspouts, yards, driveways, walkways, impervious surfaces, and can reduce the amount of runoff from your property.
- Plant some trees: Trees provide many benefits to the environment and are one of nature's best stormwater managers. Trees clean our air and filter stormwater. Their canopies intercept water. Their roots stabilize the ground and increase infiltration. Fallen leaves help by slowly absorbing and releasing water.
- Plant riparian buffers with native trees and shrubs: Riparian buffers are the vegetated areas adjacent to streams, which protect them from the adverse impact of suburban and agricultural land use.
- Convert your lawn to a meadow: Consider using native perennials and grasses on your lawn or on a small portion of your lawn. Native plants have more extensive root systems than turf grass. Meadows are aesthetic and create a natural habitat for wildlife.
- Keep your greens, green: Do not apply fertilizer before spring or within 15-20 feet of a stream or waterway. Use grass clippings, which are high in nutrients, as natural fertilizer. Chemicals and salt affect your grass. Add sand or kitty litter as a natural alternative for increased traction in winter weather.
- Add rain barrels: Rain barrels are used to capture from downspouts and store rainwater. Collected water can then be used to water plants, gardens, wash tools, extinguish campfires, fill bird baths, etc.
- Disconnect and redirect downspouts: Check to ensure downspouts drain into a garden, yard, or rain barrel rather than into storm drains or onto impervious surfaces such as driveways and sidewalks.
- Pervious pavers: Consider pervious pavers when constructing a patio or walkway. The thick stone base underneath allows water to soak into the ground.
- Participate in litter clean ups: Come out and help reduce the amount of plastics and other trash from entering local waterways and join the West Vincent Litter Lifters at litterliftersofwestvincent@gmail.com.

Each small adjustment we make as individuals creates an impressive collective impact and keeps our watersheds and community healthy.

Clean Energy Transition Team (CETT) - Kirk Reinbold, Sustainability Committee Chair

The WV CETT and the Administration work together to ensure the Township develops and implements clean energy goals, such as energy efficiency and on-site renewable energy generation technologies. The expectation is to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and improve overall resilience to climate change, while simultaneously lowering operational expenses.

One example of the combined energy efficiency and cost savings has been realized in the Police Department's 2020 purchase of a hybrid SUV. Within the first four months of operation, that vehicle cost 45% less to operate and had improved vehicle power performance, compared to a standard gas vehicle. A second hybrid purchase has been authorized and a fully electric police vehicle fleet is currently under consideration by the Board of Supervisors and the Administration.

CETT is also working with businesses and residents interested in improving energy efficiency and transitioning to a cleaner and healthier environment. The Team is identifying mechanisms such as grants, special loans, rebates, and incentives that can assist in funding many of these projects.



How You Can Help

CETT would like to engage our residents and businesses to help catalog our community's tangible efforts to improve energy efficiency and clean energy use in township businesses, homes, and personal and fleet vehicles.

Clean energy projects may include insulation and weatherstripping, replacing incandescent with LED light bulbs, HVAC improvements, alternative fuel vehicle purchases, installing vehicle chargers, and/or installing solar arrays.

RECYCLING - Saving dollars and making "sense"

THANK YOU to all West Vincent Township residents who are committed to reducing, reusing and recycling their waste plastic, glass, metal, and paper!

Recycling is an important component in preserving our environment and creating a sustainable community. Recycling reduces the amount of raw materials needed to create new products, lessening the overall impact on natural resources. It also creates jobs, decreases pollution, and helps improve our health.

The WVT **Sustainability Committee** and Administration are committed to be your "go to" resource for recycling information and education. Did you know:

• Each resident (or their development HOA) in West Vincent is required to find their own private trash hauler. All haulers are required to register with the township and provide recycling services to their customers, meeting the requirements in our township code. Check with your trash hauler for guidance on how to maximize the effectiveness of your recycling efforts.





Most of the recycling haulers in WVT have these three basic rules for their customers:

o RULE #1: Recycle clean bottles and cans, paper and cardboard.
o RULE #2: Keep food and liquid out of your recycling.
o RULE #3: No loose plastic bags and no bagged recyclables.

- Some of the recycling haulers that service residents of WVT are contracted directly with a Home Owners' Association (HOA), others are contracted directly with the resident. The contracts may include "single stream" recycling, which allows for all recycled items to be placed into a single bin for collection, or it may be "dual stream", which requires the resident to separate material into categories, like mixed paper and commingled containers (plastic, glass & metal). All residents are encouraged to check with their contracted hauler or HOA to understand their requirements. Don't forget to rinse out glass, metal and plastic food containers before placing them in your recycle bin.
- The PA Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) provides incentives to townships for implementing recycling programs and providing recycling education. Our township receives DEP grants which amount to thousands of dollars each year, based on the amount of recycling private haulers removed from our township.
