Fellowship Trail Update

Many residents have noticed construction happening both in and around Andrew Evans Park lately. West Vincent Township is thrilled to acknowledge the continued construction of the Fellowship Trail!



This segment of the trail will connect Andrew Evans Park with the trail that had ended on Fellowship Road just outside of Weatherstone. Construction is steadily happening with substantial completion scheduled for July 2025. We hope the extension of the Fellowship Trail will see more residents from Weatherstone able to hike or bike to our park in the future.

"No Knock" Registry Available

In February, our supervisors signed an ordinance amending the solicitation laws in West Vincent Township. Ordinance No. 212-2025 authorized the creation of an online registry where residents could add their addresses to a list of locations where solicitors were NOT allowed to visit. The "No Knock" registry is maintained by our West Vincent Police Department, and it is currently accepting submissions from Township residents.

Barring political and religious groups, all other for-profit solicitors within our Township are required to get permits from our administrative office. Once they complete the process, they are given a permit, badges for each authorized employee/solicitor, plus the list of address of homes that they are NOT allowed to visit. If you have signed this list and receive a for-profit solicitation, please let the police and our office know. Likewise, if a solicitor cannot produce a Township-generated permit and badge, please let us know. The company and solicitor can be fined up to \$1,000 by the police.

While the "No Knock" registry will stop stop for-profit peddlers from knocking on your door, it legally cannot stop political canvassing or reglious groups sharing their faith which are considered forms of non-commercial free speech. However, adding a "No Trespassing" sign to your property or asking uninvited visitors to leave could then be considered trespassing if ignored. Since this is not considered soliciting, a "no solicitors" sign will not suffice.

Visit the front page of our Township website (<u>westvincenttwp.org</u>) to have your address added to the "No Knock" registry. No information from this list will be shared with anyone other than the address of where NOT to solicit.

"Ordinance No. 212-2025: No Knock" and the solicitation permit can also be found on our website for companies looking to register for solicitation.

Pollinator Power

A pollinator is anything that helps carry pollen from one flower to another, allowing plants to become fertilized and produce fruits, seeds, and young plants. Although some plants are self-pollinating, almost 90% of all plant species need the help of insects and animals to transfer pollen. Pollinators in Pennsylvania are bees, butterflies, beetles, moths, flies, wasps, hummingbirds and small mammals.

Pollinator decline in recent years is a big, complicated problem, but it is by no means unsolvable. Since a large part of the decline of pollinators is being caused by human actions — pesticide use, drought, habitat destruction and more — it can be reversed by humans, too.

Bees in particular need hollow-stemmed plants for nesting, and they also need pollen and nectar-rich flowers for food. Native plants are always the best choices for pollinator gardens because of their abundance of nectar and pollen in addition to being low maintenance, generally pest free, drought tolerant, and ability to control erosion. While many people consider them naturally beautiful, they are also over 4 times more attractive to bees than non-native plants.

8 Native Plants for Bees

- Wild Bee Balm (Monarda didyma or Monarda fistulosa)
- Asters (Aster spp.)
- Coneflowers (Echinacea spp. or Ratibida spp.)
- Joe Pye Weed (Eutrochium spp.)
- Purple Giant Hyssop (Agastache scrophulariifolia)
- Blueberries (Vaccinium spp.)
- Bloodroot (Sanguinaria canadensis)
- Milkweed (Asclepias spp.)

Another way to help is to decrease the use of pesticides on your lawn and garden. Pesticides used to prevent grubs and bugs can also kill pollinators. And maybe as a special treat to both the pollinators and yourself, consider reduced mowing and allow flowering vegetation such as clover and dandelions to be present in your grass. Let's BEE proactive and help our pollinators!


Yoga in the Park

Celebrating Sheeder-Hall Bridge

Township Red Cross Blood Drive: 6/17

In our Township of 6,600 residents, it is estimated that 2,500 are qualified to donate blood. Last summer, only 18 residents signed up to donate blood at our township's Red Cross Blood Drive. This is 0.72% of eligible donors. The generosity of our residents is normally unparalleled... except for blood donation. PLEASE HELP US DO BETTER ON JUNE 17th.

The Bloody Facts:

- Red Cross supplies 40% of the nation's blood.
- Only 38% of the nation's population is qualified to donate.
- Nearly 5,000 units of platelets and 6,500 units of plasma are needed daily in the U.S.
- Donated red blood cells have a shelf life of 42 days, while platelets can only be stored for 5 days, and plasma can be frozen for up to a year.
- Blood transfusions are crucial for patients undergoing surgeries, battling cancer, recovering from traumatic injuries, and managing chronic illnesses.
- Blood cannot be manufactured and relies entirely on the generosity of donors.



Upcoming Chester County Household Hazardous Waste Events

We regularly receive phone calls asking what residents should do with items such as old gas or oil, cleaning chemicals, and spray paint, to name a few. THANK YOU for taking an interest in how to properly dispose of waste! Most trash haulers, as well as the Lanchester Landfill, do not accept items classified as "hazardous waste". Hazardous waste takes many forms:

In order to properly dispose of these types of items, West Vincent residents need to register to drop off items at scheduled household hazardous waste ("HHW") events in Chester County There are four events each year. The remaining three events for 2025 are as follows:

- Fri, June 20: Coatesville Learning Center (1635 E. Lincoln Hwy)
- Sat, August 23: Oxford School District Administrative Building (125 Bell Tower Ln)
- Sun, October 5: Downingtown Middle School (115 Rock Raymond Rd)

Registration is required for each event and will be available online a few weeks before each event at chestercountyswa.org.

The maximum amount of accepted waste at each event is 25 gallons or 220 lbs. (no metal drums). Please note that the events do NOT accept the following tems:

Will a Fire Truck Fit Down Your Driveway?

In the event of an emergency, firefighters may need to access your home. If access to your home is not clear and they need to find alternate access, those seconds begin to really count.


It is important to establish a safe route with adequate access for emergency vehicles. Here are steps you can take to prepare your driveway to speed access and reduce property damage:

- Position your address sign to be visible from the road from either direction.
- Clear branches or brush from your driveway so it is at least 12' wide with 14' of clearance for fire trucks.
- Be sure your driveway's surface is firmly packed and can support the weight of emergency vehicles even in the spring when the ground is soft.
- Check that your driveway is free of gates, fence posts or other objects that could restrict access.
- Create a space at the end of your driveway with adequate width and clearance for firetrucks.



Planting Positivity in the Right-of-Ways

A right-of-way ("ROW") is a type of easement granted over the land for transportation purposes (all the roadways in our township have ROWs). It can include shoulders, berms, and additional areas needed for highway purposes such as drainage, slopes, etc. The size of a ROW varies between road segments and may extend beyond the paved road and shoulders. For example, Route 100 has an 80' ROW (40' from center line), while St. Matthews, Conestoga, Kimberton, Birchrun, Pughtown and Hollow Roads have 60' ROWs (30' from center line). "Newer" township roads (starting in the 80's) have 50' ROWs, and many extend well behind the curbs and sidewalks.




Township code requires property owners to keep the ROWs free from plantings, trees, rocks, signs and other items. There are really no exceptions. These codes were enacted for the safety of drivers and pedestrians, safety of utility lines, and to extend the life of roads.

What does this mean for property owners? Simply put, if property owners do not maintain their ROWs, the Township is allowed to remove items in the ROWs with the owner incurring the expense for removal. Per the code, if the owner fails to pay or reimburse the Township within 30 days of notice of the expenses, the Township may record a lien against the property for the balance due or take any other appropriate legal action. Please keep in mind that this is for safety reasons, and we are hoping to plant positivity around maintaining ROWs

ID Theft: News from our WVPD

Our community has seen an uptick recently in identity theft and scams using stolen personal information. This can include opening new accounts, making purchases, or even accessing existing accounts in the victim's name. Scammers are using various tactics to steal information, including online, through phone calls or social media, and even in person. "Phishing" has become a more common term as scammers are using emails, texts or phone calls as bait to see how much information victims are willing to share.

Keep Your Identity Safe

- Do not answer phone calls, texts, social media messages, or email from numbers or people you do not know.
- Do not share personal information like your bank account info, Social Security number, or date of birth.
- Collect your mail every day, and place a hold on your mail when you will be on vacation or away from your home.
- Review credit card and bank account statements. Watch for and report unauthorized or suspicious transactions.
- Store personal information, including your Social Security card, in a safe place. Do not carry it in your wallet.

Steps to Take If You Become a Victim

To make certain that you do not become responsible for any debts incurred by an identity thief, you must prove that you didn't create the debt to each of the companies where accounts were opened or used in your name. The Federal Trade Commission developed an *Identity Theft Affidavit* to make it easier for fraud victims to report information. This form can be found on our website. While many companies accept this affidavit, others require that you submit more or different forms. Before you complete the affidavit, contact each company to find out if they accept it.

Please fill out this affidavit which is located on our website and return it to West Vincent Township Police Department in person, by fax to 610-458-3206, or email to admin@wvpolice.org in order for an officer to generate a police report.

You can also file a complaint online with the the FBI Internet Crime Complaint Center for suspected internet-facilitated criminal activity at ic3.gov.

Did You Know...? Reflecting on Safety

They mysteriously began showing up on utility poles throughout Pennsylvania, starting around 2017 – those yellow, reflective waffle grids you were probably seeing without fully realizing it. Now they are ubiquitous, affixed to over half of PECO's 400,000+ poles here in the Commonwealth.



These obvious standouts are a sensible safety measure to garner the attention of passing motorists and cyclists, helping those commuting on roadways to better notice the pole it is secured onto, especially during nighttime travel and just as critically, to quickly put poles into the line of sight of distracted drivers.

So, if you've been spotting these interestingly shaped objects but didn't know what they were for, then PECO's mission is working! Regardless of what you think they are, you're espying the grid and its companion utility pole, which in turn is, hopefully, keeping you safely away from them both!

It's a lovely time of year to enjoy the many trails and parks of West Vincent. But what is NOT so lovely is passing pet poop on those walks, or worse, STEPPING in pet poop!

This is a friendly reminde that residents and vistors are expected to pick up after their pets. While many of our parks are equipped with pick-up bags at

various locations, not all of the parks have recepticles to leave the bags, and some people seem confused by what to do with these pungent presents. The short answer is: take it with you when you leave.

Our trails and parks follow "leave no trace" principles. To minimize the impact to these locations, make sure that all trash is either in a garbage can or walking out with you. You wouldn't leave diapers on the trails, so don't leave your furry-baby's waste either.
