On the Agenda

Plan reviews continue for Toll Mid-Atlantic's proposed 47-home subdivision at South Chester Springs Road. The Township Engineer and Traffic Engineer will review revised plans in the coming weeks, so this project will not be considered at the Board of Supervisors Business Meeting on February 16. At the Work Session held on this evening representatives for the Historical Commission will discuss efforts to update the Township's Historic Resource Inventory. If you're a history buff, this is a can't miss event. The Work Session gets underway at 6pm.

The Planning Commission will meet on February 26 to review a Conditional Use Application to construct a 74-unit residential development at Pottstown Pike. The proposed development includes 28 single-family detached homes and 46 town homes. The plan is posted to westvincentwp.org. Take a peek.

The Zoning Hearing Board will not meet in February. And that's not a bad thing for our taxpayers, as State Law requires municipalities to foot the bill for a large portion of the cost to hold these public hearings.

Our other commissions, councils, and boards will likewise meet in February. Meeting agenda are posted to westvincentwp.org no later than the Friday before the meeting. Check it out!

Welcome Chief Getz

Bradley Getz will assume the position as West Vincent Township Chief of Police on February 17, 2026. Chief Getz served with the Pennsylvania State Police for 25 years, retiring in March of 2024. Chief Getz held numerous leadership positions with the State Police that included Troop Commander, Station Commander, Crime Section Commander and Patrol Section Commander. Most of his roles were held in stations throughout southeastern Pennsylvania.

For the last approximately two years Chief Getz has served as the Chief of Police for Lancaster Township (pop. 18,600), Lancaster County. In this position, he worked to create a brand-new municipal police department after Lancaster Township decided to end its contract with a neighboring municipality for police services. Chief Getz led the effort to build a police building, hire officers, establish policies, purchase and outfit vehicles, and do everything else needed to start a new police department... in less than one year!

Chief Getz has resided in southwestern Montgomery County his entire life and graduated from The Hill School and Ursinus College where he earned a Bachelor's degree in Politics & American Government and played on the men's soccer team.

Chief Getz replaces Chief Michael Swinger, who proudly served our community for 30 years. We thank Chief Swinger for his service!
